Grade 3-4 Symbolism in Indigenous Art

Our Grade 3-4 students have delved deep into symbolism in Indigenous culture. We have learnt how symbols and art were used as a 'written language' and that art creates meaning. We used this knowledge to try and design a boomerang using symbols that told a story (that the students came up with). We are really proud of the time and consideration each student put into their design. In the coming weeks, students will replicate these designs onto wooden Boomerangs and paint them with 'ochre' style colours.

Grade 5-6 Collaborative Indigenous Style Art

The 5-6 students are loving the theory aspect of this unit. So far we have learnt about the history of Indigenous art, symbols, dot paintings, ochres, The Dreaming and the Wurundjeri land (and the huge area it covers)! Did you know that archaeologists have dated some Aboriginal Art to around 30,000 years old? That is the oldest known art form in the world!!!! We have been creating a collaborative art piece to hopefully be displayed in the school.
